SAFCO Support Foundation ("SSF") is a Not for Profit Company registered under section 42 of the Companies Ordinance 1984, established in May 2009. SSF originates from Sindh Agricultural and Forestry Workers Coordinating Organization (SAFWCO) which is a non-government and not for profit organization established in 1986 and registered in 1993 under the Societies Act XXI of 1860. SAFWCO with 25 years of excellence in delivering social development services, enterprises development and financial access to destitute of rural Sindh through integrated development approach transformed microcredit unit in a public company as specialized microfinance institution (MFI).

In the last Thirteen years, SSF restructured itself to demonstrate how blend of service delivery and advocacy can help the organization become financially sustainable at operational level. Having completed years of development collaboration with client communities and public sector organization, SSF has spin off its microfinance and financial services with transformation and creating a For-Profit Microfinance Subsidiary Company and looking towards building the microfinance operations into a corporate system for the people from August, 2022. SSF is providing services in rural and urban areas of Sindh province/state of Pakistan and is currently operational with 06 IFL Loan Scheme branches in two districts of Sindh province/state of Pakistan and are providing services to Government of Sindh as implementation partner for Sindh Peoples Housing for Flood Affectees communities in other two districts of Sindh province/state of Pakistan.



Until now, up to 39,424 IFL clients have been served out of which 65% are female clients whereas 35% are male clients. These clients are served with interest free loans of PKR 1.186 billion through six loan centers in two district of Sindh.

Housing Project

SAFCO has also been involved in various projects and possess a viable experience in the housing projects as well in construction of the houses, model villages and the rural housing in the post flood situation in 1990s as well as in the floods in 2010 and 2011. With its vast experience in the rural development and housing, recently SAFCO had been engaged with the Government of Sindh's implementation partner Sindh Peoples Housing for Flood Affectees and has been engaged in project designing and execution with the joint collaboration of the government and the non-government organizations. SAFCO, in the phase of project design was in complete interaction and discussion on the housing reconstruction procedures and design including the strategies which are required to be adopted in the project execution. SAFCO formally signed the project agreement with SPHF in the Resilient Sindh Conference held at Karachi on February 08, 2023. In the project execution and implementation, the SAFCO is working as implementation partner with the following responsibilities;

- Damage Assessment and validation of the affected Households by conducting the thorough damage assessment and eligibility survey to establish eligible beneficiaries for the housing subsidy grants based on the predefined damage criteria and beneficiary selection criteria
- 2. Data collection and entry into the GIS-enabled project management Information system (MIS) for eligible beneficiaries
- 3. Classification of damages into fully and partially damages and update the validation assessment
- 4. Gathering of the information and documentation records from the beneficiaries for eligibility i.e. CNIC/ Form B, land eligibility documents, registry documents, succession certificates, guardianship certificate
- 5. Assist beneficiaries in guidance of the overall damage assessment/ validation and the grant funding process and assist them in opening of the bank accounts at the nearest banks
- 6. Guide and assist the beneficiaries in the land registration and documentation process for their own asset allocation by the government in coordination with the local government
- 7. Ensure the reconstruction of houses in compliance with the resettlement policy framework (RPF), preveland land use plans, identification of and liaison with community

- representatives and related stakeholders, Vulnerable/disadvantages communities who can possibly be disproportionately affected by the project activities
- 8. Organizing trainings / capacity building activities for the affected communities along with supporting training for artisans on guidelines for multi hazard resilient housing reconstruction / retrofitting along with other essential capacity building activities including but not limited to environmental and social considerations for the execution of civil works and as per requirements and provisions of the project.
- 9. Verification of Construction Quality and Milestones and provide information as per requirements of the project on defined formats including provision of data in MIS.
- 10. Extend necessary support and facilitation to third party / Independent Validator / other supervision missions as per the requirements of the project.
- 11. Ensure implementation, monitoring and reporting of relevant World Bank social and environmental standards and local regulatory framework, as per defined requirements of the project in a manner acceptable to Employer
